IRHS Introduces Their New VHP Club

Ironwood Ridge's Social Studies teacher Don Dickinson was motivated to start a VHP club after completing a booklet several years ago based on his father's life. Dickinson's father was killed in Austria during WWII right at the end of the war as part of Patton's tank corps. The effort made him realize the sacrifices veterans have made to preserve America's freedoms. When he heard about the

project from VHP Show Low Advisor Pam Lizardi, he was keen on bringing the club to his campus. "The club has over 25 members who are very dedicated students. They are looking forward to sharing Southern Arizona veterans' stories in the next volume of *Since You Asked*," said Dickinson.

On Saturday, September 24th, the Cactus Shadow High School training team arrived in Oro Valley to kickoff the club's efforts. Advisor Hatch, VHP director Laura Byers, and a student team of Ashley Durham, Rachel Vessels, and Nima Sadeghi were welcomed by enthusiastic club members who jumped in immediately after training to interview two veterans. As part of the training exercise, WWII USMC veteran Gerry Jones was interviewed by CSHS's Chase Hinkle. Also on hand at Shea Middle School were Honor Flight representatives from Prescott, Arizona, who sat in on VHP's training session. Honor Flight, a non-profit, flies veterans to Washington, DC to visit and reflect at their appropriate memorial. SCHOOL from page 1 - School's VHP Academic Community and form the heart of what will become a nationwide program.

Barbara Hatch, founder of the year-and-a-halfold VHP non-profit, is pleased that the program is expanding according to plan. "We are in our mid-phase of a three-year pilot to create a reproducible, scalable program. Our goal is to enable other schools to do what the Cactus Shadows High School club has done—become self-sustaining. What that means is that the program can stand on its own two feet and overtime help spawn other schools nearby. A selfsustaining school is where students want to join and fully participate in the club, they're able to develop strong support from the school district and local veterans' community, the group is able to fulfill the requirements of the interview process, and within a few years are able to publish and finance up-front their own volume of Since You Asked. This last goal is of course for schools where the project has really taken off. We need to be assured that our first 'ripple' into other schools can achieve these goals before we know our model works," says Hatch. "We are very encouraged with the quality and commitment of our VHP Advisors. They're awesome," says an enthused Hatch!

Many observers of the VHP approach see the project as a new model for education. This program is unique in that it is not just a once-in-amoment interview with a veteran. The experience is far more engaging for both the students and veterans, leaving lasting impressions. Veterans are able to pass along their stories of ser-

vice while students learn of their veteran's sacrifice to preserve America's values. Some of these values include hard work, perseverance, critical thinking, leadership and civic-mindedness. "These values inspire students to excel and to pursue the American

Dream. Through the program, students acquire the tools and skill sets necessary to manage the project, learn to collaborate with others and produce a high quality endproduct which really distinguishes them when pursuing college as they enter the job market or participate in government," says retired Phoenix businessman and Advisor to VHP, Tim Ganahl. "These students are transformed, and it's great to know that veterans and advisors were instrumental," says Ganahl.



VHP Scholarships

Did you know that VHP awards scholarships each spring at its annual reception and book signing event? Awards ranged from \$250 to \$750. To be eligible, seniors have to have been active members in their club; have two years of participation; and be eligible for full-time undergraduate admission to an accredited four-year college or university, a two-year college or trade school, or be destined to any branch of the U.S. Military. Dick Doubek, VHP Treasurer and Vietnam Veteran will make available applications for scholarship by March 1, 2012. Deadline for submission will be March 15, 2012 11:59PM.

VHP is dedicated to

preserving the stories of America's veterans. Students interview veterans from both wartime and peacetime, from all branches of the United States Military, and write down their experiences into essays. These essays are then compiled by Project members into a published volume of stories, which is sent to the Library of Congress through the Veterans History Project, the governmental and national version of VHP. The Project expects to add schools from a number of states, creating student programs to interview veterans nationwide.
